### **Presidents Message:**

Welcome to the July newsletter-I hope your summer is getting off to a great start! Have even more fun by coming to the Guild Picnic on July 9<sup>th</sup> at 5-8pm. If you like to do plein air painting, there will be a group doing that starting at 4pm- so bring your art supplies and join them. If you have not done plein air before, now is a good time to try it!

After a lot of discussion, the Board has decided that we WILL NOT have a fall show. We have been asking for volunteers since the first of the year and have not had nearly enough volunteer support to put on the show. Perhaps next year we can have our fall show again. To do that we will need to get started with the planning NOW. It takes a long lead time to line up sponsors, locations, volunteers, paper work, etc.

We will, however, have a "juried" show early next year-perhaps in March. We have had a number of our artists ask for a juried show. A juried show requires a smaller staff of volunteers to accomplish. Being in a juried show is important to establish your credentials as a serious artist. Having juried shows on your resume will help you sell your work and will also help you get commissions to do work.

The juried show will be held at the Grapevine Gallery inside Singer Hill Café in Oregon City. You will need to submit your art in the normal "juried" show format of photo, either hard copy or electronic. We will have a non-member artist select the paintings that will be allowed into the show- this is the "Jury" process. You can submit up to 3 paintings (photos) for \$30 and the jury judge will select the best of all the paintings submitted. The number of paintings allowed in will be determined by the size of the Gallery space we will have available to us. You could have all three accepted or just one, two, or none accepted. The entry fee is non-refundable even if you do not have any paintings accepted. Accepted paintings will hang in the Gallery for 30 days and if they sell, the Gallery will take a 38% commission fee. It is expected that all paintings entered will be for sale. We will also have a different 'Judge' come in during the showing and award ribbons like we normally do.

Note the mention in this newsletter on the June Demo and Workshop. Both Denise Tischler and Bea Greening used the overhead video projection to enhance their classes. This process allows all to see what the artist is doing without limiting the size of the class or requiring the teacher to repeatedly hold up their canvas.

## Doodle Demo Delightful




Having a past history as both a teacher and a principal, **Denise Tischler**, NCAG member, knows how to engage an audience and motivate them to learn something new. She did just that with the members at the June NCAG meetings with her lively demo on her doodling process. Doodling was something she started while enduring boring lectures in college. And it was a fun way to

connect with the inner child.

Truly her works of art are a form of self- expression. She shared doodles that she has made into cards for various occasions, from timely graduation cards to one done as a

memorial to her uncle Joe that included all the aspects of life that he loved doing and that reminded her of him. She is inspired by things that she has seen or done.

The process she goes through to produce these intricate gems was fun to watch. Denise demoed under the overhead projector that our Pres Forrest developed so we could all see how a piece progresses. She always starts at the center of the page and has not preplanned what the piece will end up looking like which is very freeing to her. At times she starts with some templates she borrowed from her husbands



work briefcase, but a simple line or shape will do just as well.

Those simple curves and circles soon took on a life of their own as she embellished them and filled in the spaces with solid colors, dots or lines. She normally works in crisp black and white but is beginning to experiment with adding small spots of color. She uses Crescent 92-08 hi line Board for a surface and uses a variety of pens, from micron pens, technical drawing pens, Tombos and Sharpies (although she cautions that the Sharpies will bleed).

You will find Denise doodling during NCAG meetings or while watching movies, and



especially late at night...often drawing for 4-6 hours at a time till 3am. Her work is for sale at the Grapevine Gallery in Oregon City in the form of cards and she is exploring other venues for displaying

her art . To top off the demo, she challenged the group to each make a doodle art out of a squiggle she had printed on paper for each of us. It was fun to see how varied the outcome was from so many talented artists that each started with the same simple form on a blank page. Try it for yourself, you will feel the creative juices start to flow....its fun.

# What to Bring to the Annual Picnic July 9<sup>th</sup> .....5-8pm


- Your favorite potluck dish to share.

Pictured above is the watercolor floral Bea started during the evening Demo in May so we could see the finished product. Bea is a wonderful watercolor instructor with years of experience. We were lucky to have her teach.

Bea took advantage of our overhead projecting of her work at both the May demo and her June Workshop. This works well for art that needs to lay flat but still be seen by the entire group.

Bea Greening held her one day workshop on painting florals in watercolor (or other media). It was reported to be a fun day for the 5 students attending. We need more attendance at future workshops to make them self supporting and not drain the Guild budget which needed to subsidize the room rental.

Workshops are a great member benefit and a way our experienced artists can share their knowledge and help us all improve our skills or try something new.

We are trying to keep the tuition very reasonable, please consider signing up for future Workshops so we can continue to grow this valuable program.

If you would like to teach a workshop, we encourage you to do a demo at a prior meeting.

### Some things I learned at the June Meeting!

- 1. Wendy DeHart feels a painting is more cohesive when a limited palette is used.
- 2.Jerry Schmidt two toned his frame, darkening the upper half, to help his sky show up better and it worked.
- 3. Forrest reports he Googled Art Galleries looking for a

- show venue and found 44 local galleries! How many have you visited?
- 4.Polyester Fiberfill works great as a mask when airbrushing soft white and grey cloud edges against a blue sky.
- 5. When highlighting stars in a sky, make sure all the starburst angles are running in the same direction.
- 6.Computer hint- download Classic Shell to make Windows 8 act like Windows 7 (which more people apparently like).
